YOUTH QUALITY ASSURANCE

Per the Ohio Department of Agriculture – ALL Quality Assurance MUST be completed 45 days prior to the first day of your CARROLL COUNTY fair. This means the last day Carroll County youth can take a quality assurance class/test is June 1, 2023

- The Quality Assurance Program will have new and updated information again this year.
 - a. All the dates for Carroll County Quality Assurance are listed on the 4-H calendar!
 - We will be requiring that reservations be made for the class you wish to attend.
 - c. ENCOURAGE your members who have been involved for a couple years to watch for and participate in the TEST OUT OPTIONS. Passing the test can provide them with the opportunity of not having to attend a class for 3 years!
 - d. **Test- out Opportunity** is April 5. All testing times are held at the Extension office.
 - e. Quality Assurance Class is April 25 Location of these classes are at the Ashton Event Center. (New Show Arena)
 - f. Still Project Quality Assurance will be 1 hour prior to the times listed above. (In person only. Will come up with a plan if cannot be attended in person)

What Can You Exhibit at the Carroll County Fair?



Early Season Pasture Management

Most pastures are looking lush and green again. Thanks to some perfect temperature days, our coolseason pasture grasses are growing well. Grazing animals seem pleased to have some fresh greens and managers certainly are relieved to see the landscape change from dreary to dreamy again.

With the good that the spring flush of growth brings, there are also some concerns that we should not forget in the midst of the joy. Now is the time that grass tetany may become a problem and bloat can be an issue too in some circumstances. We also need to continue to consider the health of our forage and soils.

Remember:

- Actively growing pastures still need rest between grazing cycles. Allowing pastures to rest can help decrease damage to the plant roots from over grazing and reduce pugging of the field due to heavy animal traffic when the ground is still soft.
- When first turning animals out onto lush pasture, limit the time that they spend grazing. Avoid turning ravenously hungry animals out on pasture. The adjustment to their diet (from stored forage to fresh forage) can cause disruption to the digestive tract (leading to bloat or diarrhea) and disrupt the balance of minerals in the body. Continue to provide hay for the animals for the first few weeks of grazing.
- Grass tetany is a risk in early spring because the ratio of magnesium in the forage can be too low and cause an imbalance of magnesium in the blood of grazing livestock, which can lead to death. Animals that are lactating are at greater risk for grass tetany than non-lactating animals. To help combat the risk of grass tetany, provided a good source of free-choice mineral with adequate magnesium leading up to and through the early grazing period.
- Avoid applying nitrogen fertilizer until after the first grazing cycle (probably until May). Applying nitrogen too early will encourage grass to grow faster and taller but will likely stress the root system. Always start your fertility management strategies with doing a soil test!

It is exciting and gratifying to send animals out to graze, just keep these things in mind as we get into the swing of spring.





Spotted Lanternfly

Its that time of year again to be on the lookout for spotted lanternflies. As the weather gets warmer this invasive species will start to hatch usually in May and June, since we did not have a very bad winter the hatch could be massive this year.

So why are they bad, they love to feed on grapes, fruit trees, and about 70 other types of plants that we know. They excrete a sugary substance called honeydew. Unfortunately, this honeydew encourages the growth of black sooty mold on the plants and fruit. They are a real threat to vineyards and orchards. They also love to feed on Tree of Heaven, so if you have any growing on your farm, get rid of it.

If you see any egg masses or adults please scrape them off or stomp them. Remember to take a picture, write down the location, then make a report to OSU Extension Carroll County at 330-627-4310 or the Ohio Department of Agriculture-Plant Health Division at 614-728-6270. Help Ohio get rid of the Spotted Lanternfly!!

Recipe- Panko Breaded Turkey Cutlets

- 4 turkey breasts cutlets
- 2 eggs beaten
- 1/3 cup breadcrumbs/panko
- Salt and pepper
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1 teaspoon oil

Instructions

- 1. Season cutlets with salt and pepper.
- 2. Combine bread crumbs and Parmesan cheese in a medium bowl.
- 3. In another bowl beat egg whites.
- 4. Dip turkey cutlets in egg whites, then breadcrumb mixture, shaking off excess.
- 5. Heat a large nonstick frying pan on medium heat. Add the butter and olive oil.
- 6. When butter melts, add the cutlets and cook about 6 minutes on each side, until golden brown and cooked through.

Recipe-Blueberry Graham Cracker Ice Cream

- 3/4 cup fresh or frozen blueberries
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 tablespoon vanilla extract
- 2 cups heavy whipping cream
- 1 cup sweetened condensed milk
- 4 whole graham crackers, coarsely crushed

Directions

- 1. In a small saucepan, combine blueberries, sugar and vanilla. Bring to a boil; reduce heat. Simmer until mixture begins to thicken, about 5 minutes, stirring frequently. Cool completely. Refrigerate until chilled.
- 2. In a large bowl, beat cream until soft peaks form. Add condensed milk; beat until mixture thickens. Gently fold graham crackers into cream mixture. Transfer to freezer containers, allowing headspace for expansion. Drop blueberry mixture by tablespoonfuls over ice cream. Cut through ice cream with a knife to swirl. Freeze for 8 hours or overnight before serving.

EASY GARDEN SALAD RECIPE

- 8 cups mixed lettuces (romaine, iceberg, and loose leaf all work week)
- 2 carrots, shredded or chopped small
- 3 radishes, halved and sliced
- 2 mini cucumbers, sliced
- 1 pint cherry tomatoes, halved
- 1/4 of a red onion, thinly sliced
- 3/4 cup shredded cheddar cheese (optional)
- 1 cup croutons (optional)
- Kosher salt and fresh ground pepper.
- Dressing of your choice



INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Ensure all of your ingredients are chopped into bite sized pieces, then toss them all together in a large bowl. Season with Kosher salt and fresh ground pepper.
- 2. Salad can be served right away or stored in an airtight container in the fridge for 1 day. Toss with your favorite dressing right by serving.
